

1. Thesis

Strong pressure on young scientists:

- quantitative
- qualitative

Thesis: Libraries are able to relieve the pressure on Early Career Researchers



2. General Conditions for young Scientists

- Working conditions
 - fixed-term contracts
 - Iimited number of academic positions
- Publish or Perish/Least Publishable Unit
 - pressure for high quantity publishing
 - competition for high performance indicators
 - high rejection rates for highly ranked journals
 - journals require spectacular findings

2. General Conditions for young Scientists


- High pressure to publish more during doctorate
- Marketing pressure
 - rise of competition on attention
 - obligation: «publication presence» in social media
 - second- and third publications of a single finding

→ *«awareness mentality»*

\rightarrow leads to «mass publication»

3. Transformation of the Publication System

- Shift towards gold/platinum OA
 - search for suitable gold/platinum journal
- Need to acquire funding through
 - research funders
 - the own institution/community
 - third parties as foundations/library
- → Formal effort and pressure on top of research efforts


4. Support by the Library: CHANCES

Advisory structures

- support in understanding highly diverse and extensive guidelines of research funders
- identify funding opportunities
- Financial support
 - finance APCs
- Supply appropriate publications organs
 - within the library
 - accessible through the library

4. Support by the Library: LIMITATIONS

- Finding the "right" access to ECRs
- Content subject limits
- Financial limits
- Political involvement in policy on national/international/university-level
- Library as "extended arm" of funders
